Welcome to 1st Cheddington Scout Group's annual report for 2013/14. This year we have continued to deliver an excellent Scouting programme to the young people of Cheddington and the surrounding villages. Although we have had a slight drop in numbers this year, we continue to operate 2 Beaver Colonies, 2 Cub Packs, a Scout Troop and an Explorer Unit with a total of 107 young people in the group, led by 20 adults as well as a number of young leaders.

All of our sections continue to offer a full and varied programme of activities, based around Scouting principles, with camps still the most popular activity. All young people in the group, from the youngest 6 year old through to the eldest Explorer had the opportunity to go away at least twice in the last 12 months, giving them a great time, while learning about independence and team working. Training is also a key part of our programme with many young people earning the top awards for their sections; however, it is not just about hard work and every meeting is also fun for the young people ensuring that Scouting remains the highlight of their week.

We have continued to receive great support from the Group executive this year, ensuring we continue to purchase new equipment for camps and activities as well as improve the headquarters.

I hope you enjoy our report; it gives a small flavour of the great year we've had, of the fun and excitement shared by all our young members, and of the effort and dedication put in by all of the adults involved.

We have done considerable work to ensure we are financially sound and put into place procedures to ensure we are operating effectively as a charity.

Looking forward our plans to raise the money for our new HQ are about to take off in earnest and you can really help. Would you like to raise funds or do you have access to grants? Please let us know.




It's been another busy year at Beavers.

We said goodbye to two of the Beavers leaders as Naomi & Pete moved to Cubs. Nicola & Jeanette are now doing a great job running Endeavour. In Discovery, Sally has joined us as a uniformed leader, Jo is about to come back to Beavers, and Lindsay is moving to Cubs. We are very grateful for the dedication of all the adults who help in Beavers, they make such an impact on these young lives.

Our young leaders have again been brilliant. Emily Stevens has been a great help in Endeavour, and has organised and run sessions for both colonies. We are also extremely grateful to our other young leaders, George Blackburne, Jack Ainsworth, Georgia Collins and Ben Jackson. Young leaders gain life skills and leadership skills, whilst being wonderful role-models to our Beavers.

The most notable events of the year were: a trip to Tesco's in Leighton Buzzard to see behind the scenes, a trip to the pantomime at the Pendley Court Theatre to see Jack and the Beanstalk and a visit from the Reptile Roadshow, where we all got some hands-on experience with snakes, lizards, millipedes, cockroaches (yuk!), chinchillas and even an aged tortoise. We had a night hike at Ashridge, a trip to Tring Fire Station and a Parent-Beaver camp at Phasels Wood. All of these helping our Beavers to gain great experiences whilst having loads of fun.

And lots of badges have been earned, recognising and rewarding the Beavers participation and achievements and building their confidence!



Your Cub Packs

We have had another exciting year in Cubs, taking part in a wide range of activities. We had a joint session with a Sikh Cub Pack and visited the Gudwar in Southall where the Cubs learned about the Sikh faith and made new friends. A highlight was 4 of our Cubs being invested in the temple and sharing a meal at the end with out new friends. Through activities such as this we hope our Cubs have a better understanding of the world and other people in it.

Cubs have also been out and about in our local area taking part in a number of hikes, the favourite being our 'Chip Shop' hike around Tring Park, mini-beast hunts, pond dipping and creating pastel artwork at the Church. These sessions help our children develop an appreciation of the world they live in. The Cubs creative talents have also been evident in our street dance session , camp fire skits, DIY sessions and some fabulous creations involving lots and lots of paint, encouraging them to use their imagination and develop creative skills.

> Camping has always been popular. We have been den building, tracking, crate stacking, backwoods cooking, pioneering as well as having a go at archery and shooting. At our very own Hogwarts Camp we made our own wizards outfits, had our very own potions class and learned how to perform magic tricks. The Cubs enjoyed making their own version of Bertie Botts every flavour jelly beans particularly feeding the adults the hottest chilli beans going! As well as being great fun, camps like these help develop leadership skills, problem solving and independence which we hope will help the Cubs throughout their adult lives.

Your Scout Troop

The Scout Section had an average of around 20 youngsters this year, enjoying lots of varied Scouting activities.

Emphasis this year was on fitness, which was just as well, as we had several cooking evenings! These life skills prepare the young people for their future life and help build their independence as citizens.

We undertook a few new programme ideas, to help the Scouts fit into the community as they get older. We had a plumbing and electricity workshop, and also a "Sleep-Rough" night in the graveyard at St Giles' Church, to see what it is like to have no home for the night. The Scouts raised over £300 for a local homeless charity, whilst gaining a better appreciation of other peoples issues.

The Scouts also tried acting, by doing a show in groups, plus ran their ever-favourite, "Showtime", where they sing, act, dance or tell jokes! This builds self-confidence in the Scouts as well encouraging any budding Simon Cowells!

The programme is extremely varied, to ensure primarily the Scouts have fun, but with the idea being they discover more about themselves, the environment around them - and how they fit in. They then develop their own sense of knowledge, confidence and responsibility in how they approach things - especially as part of a team.

Of course there were the usual hikes, camps and outdoor games - just what young people enjoy!

Your Explorer Unit

The past year has seen a number of milestones for Cetendone Explorers. As we approach our 5th birthday we have seen some of the unit complete a full 4, some have moved on to Network and one past member has returned to the unit as a leader having completing a degree at university.

> In winter 2013 we again entered the excellent Grimsdyke Hike with two groups of Explorers using this a their Duke of Edinburgh Award practice expedition before completing their qualifying expedition in early spring. The Unit also installed their popular annual Christmas display for Cheddington village when they experienced the "kidnapping" of the snowman. He was returned safely and will be present in the larger display already planned for 2014. This independence and community involvement has shown as the Explorers have grown throughout the year.

Our Unit has been involved with other Explorers from around the country, travelling to the Isle of Wight for the annual "IOW Revolution" camp where they threw themselves into every activity and challenge, impressing the organisers so much that they I nvented a new award just for Cetendone: "Greatest Contribution to Revolution 2014".

A hardy squad were present at the final ever Sun Run camp in the Malvern Hills which, after over 20 years, has come to an end. We had to be hardy to survive as after the 13 mile hike, the party started and the final live act came on stage at 3am! Joining in with other Explorers is fun and it helps our young people feel part of a wider community.

> Other activities this year have included learning real survival skills and attending a winter survival camp, coppicing, sailing, sausage making, outdoor cinema, mask making, officiating a soapbox race at Kop Hill and enjoying the always popular Monopoly day in central London. All of these helping build their skills of leadership, problem solving and team-work and preparing them for their future endeavours.


