From my experience, you will certainly earn the respect of others in the community and gain enormous satisfaction from seeing the enjoyment you bring to the young people despite all the hard work. You may be involved for only a short time, or for many years in several different roles. I hope I have made a difference in the last 27 years, I know that you can in the future. ENJOY THE RIDE!

Group Scout Leader's Report

It's been another absolutely fantastic year for 1st Cheddington Scout Group. As described in the individual reports, all of the Sections continue to enjoy a full and varied programme of activities with camps still the most popular activity. As well as the camps, the sections have enjoyed many different events and competitions, not forgetting the all important weekly meetings which provide the core of the activities. The Scout Group is now seen as a key part of the local community, providing real benefits to our



members as well as involving all the parents and families in our activities so everyone can benefit.

Although the group has continued its good work, it has also been a real year of change. We were pleased to welcome Michelle Aulton to the Beaver Leader team in January, providing some much needed help to Lindsay. At the start of 2011, Dave and Hayden stepped down after eight years of leading the Cub Pack and a new team of parents stepped up to the mark and have successfully taken over the running of the section, mentored by Sarah Hale. Scouts and Explorers have continued a steady growth but our biggest change has been the opening of the new Beaver Colony this September, which will make a huge difference to the group. We now have a total of 116 section members, along with 23 leaders, making us one of the largest groups in the area.

For the third year running Cheddington has won the District Endeavour Trophy. This is awarded to the group who have performed most consistently throughout the year including attendance and success at District activities and competitions and is a great indication on how well the group continues to do. On the subject of Awards, I would also like to add my congratulations to Anna Wallace and Emily Hale for achieving their Gold Chief Scout's Award, the first for many years in the Scout Troop, and to the sixteen Beavers who achieved their Bronze Award.



Parental involvement has continued to grow in the group with successful fundraising events such as the Ferret Racing evening and the Village Fayre, regular help at weekly meetings and other activities such as visits and camps, help with work parties at the hut and another successful Family Camp in July. This is an area all leaders have worked hard at and it has certainly proved its worth.

Unfortunately, we are losing some of our key adults this year; Charles Storr is stepping down from Explorers after two years and we are losing Howard Boddy, Jill Griffin and Julia Robinson who are not standing for re-election as Group Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer respectively. All of these have made a huge difference to the group during their time and we are extremely grateful for the time they have dedicated to the group, particularly Howard who has been with us since 1984.

I would like to give a sincere thanks to everybody who has helped this year in making Scouting in Cheddington what it is, especially to all of our dedicated leaders who turn out every week and provide such a fantastic and imaginative programme. Although we have fewer young helpers currently than previous years, they continue to provide an essential part of our leader team and we are hoping to see more of these now the Explorer Unit is up and running. Thanks are also due to Howard and the Group Executive for their time and support in keeping the Group going. Scouting is an active organisation, without all of these people working together and giving up so much of their precious time every week of the year, none of the sections would even get off the ground. We continue to be reliant on parental support in all the sections to provide that extra hand or two at weekly meetings and outings and so a big thank you is due to all of these.

Finally, I would also like to thank all of our young people, Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers who come along to the meetings and activities and thus make all this effort so worthwhile.

Beavers



The Beaver section currently has 45 Beavers, consisting of 28 boys and 17 girls.

Over the last year, 9 (yes, nine!) new leaders have joined and have all been fantastic!

Michelle Aulton joined Ian and me after Christmas and has taken on a lot of responsibility for planning and running the sessions, and been a huge help to me.

Children on the waiting list were often not able to get

places in the colony. So in June, supported by County, we organised a campaign to assess interest in a second group. This consisted of a visit to Cheddington school, a poster campaign and an Open Evening at one of our regular Beaver sessions, which was extremely well attended. A number of children registered to join, and a number of adults came forward to be leaders. Thanks must go to Simon Aulton, Ben Storrar and Ian for all their work on this and attracting so much interest and support.

Over the summer we have been planning the new meeting and this opened on Monday 12th September, with 20 Beavers and 5 new leaders – Nick Russon, Naomi O'Dwyer, Peter Marshall, Jude Beaumont and Shaun Austin. We will operate as one colony, running the same program as much as possible. In keeping with the space theme used for lodge names, Monday's group has been name "Endeavour" and Thursday's "Discovery".

Thursday's meetings have also received some much needed help following the campaign, and three new leaders have joined us, Louise Lancaster, Jo Jones and Jeanette Barnes. Parental and young leader help continues to be very good on Thursdays, thanks in particular to Manda Hackett, Tracey Els and Stephanie Purnell.

Ian is still involved with both groups, especially for special events such as sleepovers and outings.

An amazing 16 Beavers have achieved their Chief Scouts Bronze

Award this year; a huge number of challenge and activity badges have been awarded and the Beavers' sweatshirts are well covered in an array of these. Most notable sessions include a visit from The Reptile Roadshow, a visit to Hazard Alley, a fun swim session at Aquavale and a visit by Dave Walker with his stream engine – a real hit with the Beavers! In May we held a Parent-Beaver camp at Lees Wood campsite. 15 Beavers attended with 13 parents (2 parents each had 2 children in Beavers), with the Beavers sleeping in bunk rooms and parents camping. It was a fun weekend and a popular event. We also attended the County Beaveree in May. And Discovery Beavers have recently been on a trip to RAF Hendon museum followed by a sleepover at the Scout Hut.

Cubs

The Cub Pack came under new leadership at the start of 2011 when Dave Fisher and Hayden Davies hung up their woggles after eight years. The team has been ably supported by Sarah Hale while we undergo the necessary training. We have also been helped by Rory Bush, who is working towards his Duke of Edinburgh Award.



The sessions have covered various challenges and badges; with a number of the new leaders having a science background, the science badge was an early ambition! We also covered the creativity challenge during the spring term (the Three Little Pigs performed in the style of Star Wars was quite an experience), and finished the term with an Easter Egg trail around the village. The summer term was much more focused on outdoor activities including a climbing wall (joint with Scouts), a hike (which included a number of fitness challenges including running up Ivinghoe Beacon) and a bike ride to the Bridgewater Monument at Ashridge. We also had a fun athletics session at the recreation ground and a number of the cubs are probably still getting their breath back after taking the infamous beep test!

We ran a successful day camp at Phasels Wood, which included the usual games, campfire cooking and songs, whilst the Cubs and Leaders also braved the zip wire.



The Cubs also turned their hands to flower arranging for Mothers Day and learned an essential life skill so that they could prepare a bacon sandwich and cup of tea for their dads on Father's day.

The attendance at the St George's Day Parade was very good and all of the cubs were smartly turned out and well behaved during the parade and service at Halton.

For the autumn 2011 term, we are planning to do various badges and we will have a weekend Cub Camp at Lees Wood Activity Centre. We will also welcome Jeanette

Barnes to the team as a Sectional Assistant. We also intend to maintain a great tradition of the Cub Pack and run the highly valued and appreciated Cubs Christmas Post around the village!

Treasurer's Report for the year ended 31 March 2011

Overview

The accounts are prepared on the receipts and payments basis in accordance with the Scout Association and Charity Commission guidelines.

A surplus was transferred to reserves of £1,556 (2010: £2,673) after capital spend of £283 (2010: £117) and Aylesbury Vale District Scout Group capitation charges of £2978 (2010: £3,802). CSG has retained bank and petty cash balances totalling £12,227 (2010: £10,682) at the year end.

Activities such as camps and trips were paid for out of subscription income and additional activity charges. Investment income, fundraising and donations have covered establishment costs and equipment purchases with a surplus remaining as noted above.

Subscription income and activities

Subscription income has remained steady at £6,823 (2010: £6,341) the increase being accounted for in timing differences of accounting for income compared to the prior year.

Activities have been funded by subscriptions and additional activity charges. This is a pleasing outcome as this year includes significant additional activities such as The Family Camp as well as at least one camp for each of the sections. The increased section activity costs reflect this increased level of activity and also timing differences of expenditure for activities.

Investment income

Investment income comprised rental of the scout hut to the Tring and District Model Railway Club (TDMRC) and sundry hires during the year of £590 (2010; £610) and interest on bank deposits of £2 (2008: £2).

The return on investment in bank accounts is low in line with market rates and transfer of accounts to the Charities Aid Fund bank is currently under review with the aim of increasing the return on deposits held.

Donations and Fundraising

CSG received donations of £137 in the year (2010:£512). The reduction is due to lack of funding for capital projects in the year compared to the prior year.

CSG has raised created additional funds through fundraising contributing a net £1,771 (2008: £1,497) from the ferret racing night in December 2010 (£1,079), Bonfire Night food stands (£497) and Christmas post (£195). Profits from the ferret racing night are after amounts paid to Cetendone Explorers as the evening was a joint fundraising event.

Post year end £700 of matched funding has been received from Santander (net of Cetendone Explorers share of £700).

Expenditure

Establishment expenses, including insurance, have dropped to £1,144 (2010: £1,271) due to timing of water bills and a reduction in insurance costs compared to the prior year offset by a small increase in repair costs.

Expenditure on equipment

CSG has limited expenditure on capital items during the year to £283 (2010:£117)
